

34TH ICARUS CONVENTION
ARCHIVES REFLECTING 21ST CENTURY CHALLENGES – MIGRATION AND SUSTAINABILITY

Date: 12th-14th of May Venue: Museum of Hungarian Agriculture | Budapest, Vajdahunyad Castle

The ICARUS Convention #34 will bring together diverse initiatives that explore how archival materials and practices respond to pressing global challenges of the 21st century, such as migration and climate change. The convention will be hosted by the National Archives of Hungary on May 12–14, 2025 in Budapest at the Museum of Hungarian Agriculture (1146, Budapest, Vajdahunyad Castle).

Under the overarching theme “Archives Reflecting 21st Century Challenges,” the convention will highlight the dual role of archives as custodians of historical memory and active participants in addressing contemporary issues. Highlighted topics among others are:

1. Archives and Traces of Migration. ICARUS Convention hosts the Archives and Traces of Migration project’s closing event. This symposium will explore the archival and documentary traces of migration, examining how archives can document, preserve, and make accessible the histories of migrant communities and individuals. Despite the massive historical and growing movement of people between countries and around the globe, as well as the burgeoning economic, political, and cultural interest in many countries of origin to build closer ties with their diasporas, migrant individuals and communities often fall between the cracks of library, archival, museum, and other cultural heritage institutions.

2. Sustainable Archives and Greener Approaches. Recent events such as the pandemic, armed conflict and natural disasters have demonstrated the significant role of cultural heritage in every country. Resilience, adaptation strategies and contingency actions are crucial elements for any society. The increasing impacts of climate change, natural and man-made hazards, and related technological, environmental, and biological risks have endangered considerable parts of the archival heritage. These kinds of circumstances frequently imply the need for a quick response. Related sessions will focus on the role of archives in addressing human-made or natural catastrophes, climate change and sustainability, exploring innovative practices and strategies for reducing the environmental footprint of archival institutions.

3. Monasterium.net This event introduces the next line of features implemented in the upcoming version of Monasterium.net (MoM NG). We showcase major functional updates that enhance how users interact with the data. The presentation will cover parts of the user space, advanced (similarity) search capabilities that include textual, visual, and hybrid methods, as well as elements of explainable artificial intelligence. While primarily a presentation format, we will highlight key points with (live) demonstrations to illustrate how these innovations transform traditional browsing and search functionalities. Through this combination of overview and selected hands-on examples, participants can gain a better understanding of MoM NG's inner workings and its evolution to a cutting-edge document exploration and analysis platform.

The conference will be held in a hybrid format. It can be followed online via the links below, with a live stream and Q&A function available for remote participants.
